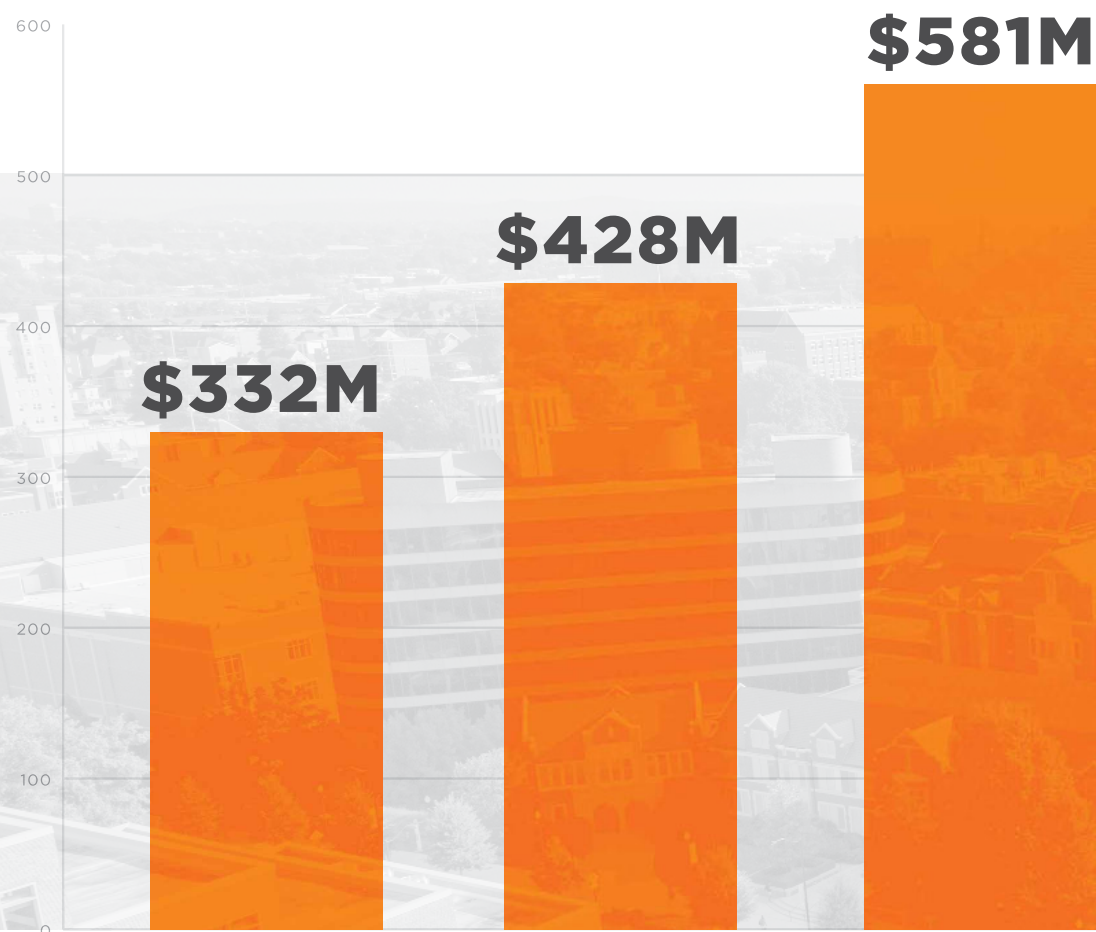

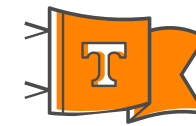

Expanding Global Learning Opportunities

The Linda and David Bohan Center for Global Engagement will create a dedicated space to support study abroad, international partnerships, and cross-cultural learning made possible through the generosity of David ('70) and Linda Bohan. It's a reflection of the College of Communication and Information's commitment to expanding access to global experiential learning opportunities and builds upon the Bohans' lifetime of service and generosity.

A Front Seat to History

Joshua Dobbs ('17) provided seven aerospace engineering students with the opportunity to attend the Artemis II rocket launch—humanity's first flight to circle the moon in more than half a century. The students also visited NASA's Exploration Ground Systems, saw the Kennedy Space Center Visitor Complex, and met with NASA experts.

Meal Plan Support Fuels Students

A gift from Jason ('92, '96) and Suzie ('97) Epstein established a meal plan scholarship endowment through the Center for Basic Needs, ensuring long-term, reliable support for students on campus who face food insecurity. Initiatives by the Center for Basic Needs have a track record of helping retain and graduate students at higher rates.

Resources That Prioritize Student Health

Knoxville native Cohl Morgan ('19) turned his diagnosis into a cause when he founded the Vols Beat Cancer Scholarship Endowment Fund. The scholarship provides financial support to any active UT student who has been diagnosed with cancer, enabling them to focus on their health while balancing studies.

Service That Builds Leaders

During the 25th year of MLK Jr. Days of Service, more than 690 students, faculty, and staff contributed 1,651 hours across 23 partner organizations—an estimated \$50,438 in community impact.

Honoring Academic Mentors

Peyton Manning's ('97) \$4 million gift recognizes the professors who shaped his UT journey, while strengthening academic excellence for future Volunteers. The gift supports the establishment of the Faye Julian Dean's Chair Endowment and the John Haas Director's Chair Endowment, each of which will open doors to bold ideas, innovation, and a best-in-class experience for students in the College of Communication and Information.



GRADUATION RATES ROSE TO RECORD HIGH FOR 5TH CONSECUTIVE YEAR

74.5% of students graduate within six years. The four-year graduation rate climbed 5.2 points, reaching a record high of 66.8%.



Legacy gifts totaling more than **\$24.5M** this year are creating scholarships, advancing research, and strengthening the future of the university.



HISTORIC \$2 MILLION ESTATE GIFT EXPANDS ARTS AND CULTURAL EDUCATION

With an estate gift divided equally between the Department of Theatre and the McClung Museum of Natural History and Culture, the late Florence Fair Johnston and Hendon Russell Johnston Jr. established a lasting legacy at UT. The largest gift in the museum's history, it will fund a new Tennessee River exhibition. This generosity also marks a transformational moment for UT, completing funding for construction of the Jenny Boyd Theatre, which is now holding productions.



GRANT WILLIAMS INVESTED \$1.5 MILLION IN THE FUTURE OF TENNESSEE

Williams' gift supports softball and men's basketball while creating the Grant Williams Scholarship Endowment in the Haslam College of Business, reflecting his commitment to student success in athletics and academics.

Equipping Students for Challenges of an Evolving World

Investing in the student experience ensures that Vols are equipped to meet the workforce of tomorrow and strengthen communities in Tennessee and beyond. Your generosity is helping equip graduates with the knowledge, skills, and hands-on experiences needed to lead in a rapidly changing world.

New academic departments and innovative degree programs are preparing students to address the growing workforce demands across a wide range of industries. The Department of Applied Engineering and Technology is helping address critical needs in manufacturing, aerospace engineering, energy conservation and storage, and applied computer science. UT also continues to lead in computing and innovation by offering a degree in applied computer science and launching the state's first degree in bioinformatics, empowering students to develop real-world solutions for agriculture and animal science.

Supporting Tennessee's Special Education Teachers

As school systems across the country grapple with teacher shortages, UT is partnering with Knox County Schools to launch the Teach Knox Fellows program, a new initiative aimed at investing in, preparing, and supporting the professional development of special education teachers at no cost to participants.

Developing the State's Nuclear Workforce Pipeline

A new partnership between UT, Roane State Community College, and the Tennessee Colleges of Applied Technology is transforming the nuclear workforce pipeline. In response to the growing demand for skilled workers in this critical industry, UT is creating seamless education pathways with hands-on training opportunities.

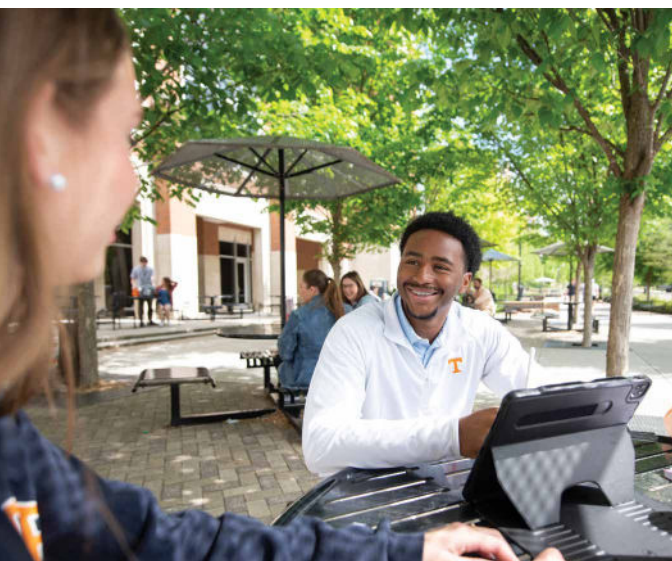
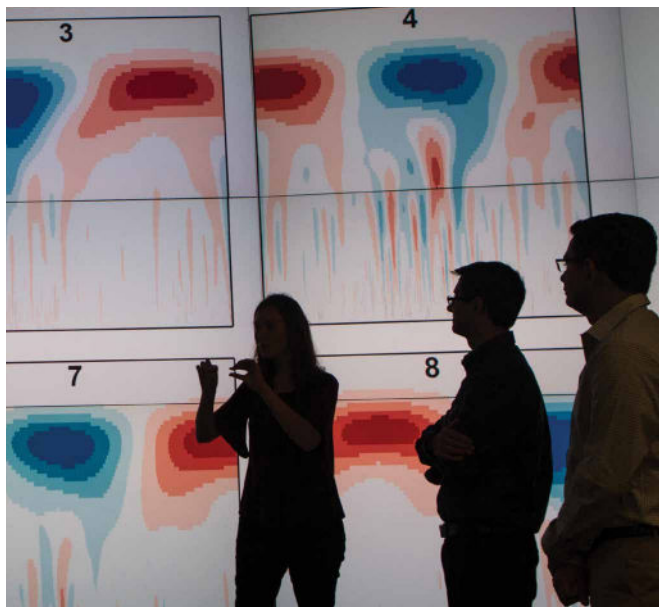

TVA Spearheads Nuclear Engineering Growth

Reinforcing East Tennessee's status as the national epicenter for building a more secure energy future, the Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) provided \$3 million to the Tickle College of Engineering to endow the department chair for the Department of Nuclear Engineering. The endowment will provide critical resources to advance the mission of the department and strengthen research initiatives aligned with industry needs.

World-Renowned Faculty Light the Way

Across disciplines, UT faculty and researchers are consistently recognized internationally as the best of the best. From making groundbreaking discoveries to mentoring students and guiding the next generation of leaders, our faculty lead the way in innovation.

- Six of the world's most highly cited researchers are Volunteers—an honor only one in 1,000 scientists and social scientists receive from Clarivate. Their research publications rank among the top 1% by citations in their respective fields over the past decade.
- Five UT faculty members received a Fulbright award, one of the most prestigious and competitive international exchange fellowships in the world.
- Three researchers received National Science Foundation CAREER awards for their work in chemistry, physics, and computer science.
- Four faculty members were selected as 2025 Fellows of the American Association for the Advancement of Science (AAAS), bringing the university's total number of AAAS fellows to date to 103.

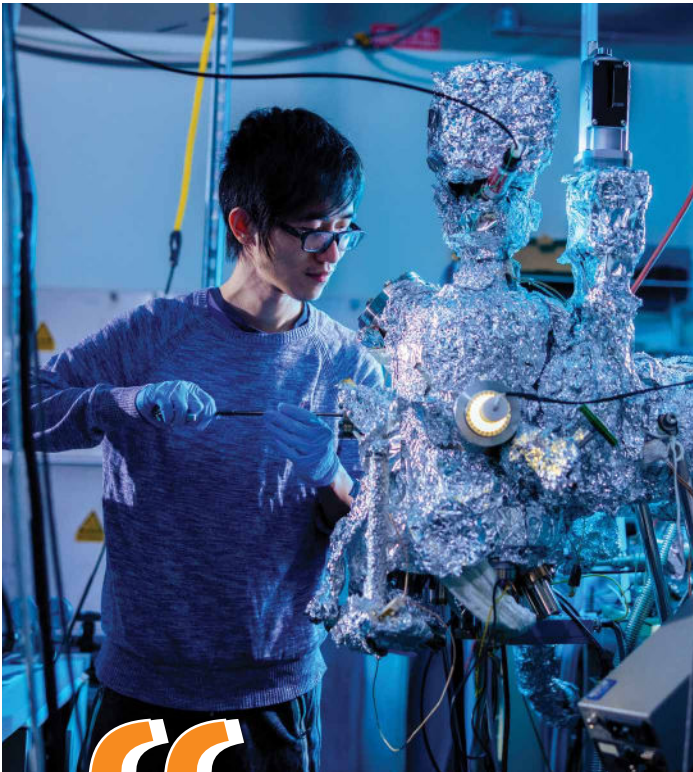
ADVANCING A BOLD VISION

Turfgrass on the World Stage

UT's world-renowned turfgrass experts led a first-of-its-kind research collaboration with Michigan State University and FIFA to set the stage for the FIFA World Cup 26. Heading up the installation, testing, and maintenance of natural turfgrass at stadiums and training facilities across North America, UT led the way in ensuring safe and consistent fields of play for the world's biggest and most-watched sporting event.

A Hub of Innovation, Technology, and Economic Development

A plan is underway, in collaboration with the University Financing Foundation, Inc., to develop the Maplehurst Innovation District—a hub for computing and artificial intelligence located between campus and downtown Knoxville. Designed as a live-work-play neighborhood, the district will support high-tech startups, the Tennessee AI Initiative, and other innovation-driven ventures. It will join the Oak Ridge Innovation Corridor and the Peninsula Innovation District as a regional hub for public-private collaboration—fostering new technologies, launching new companies, and driving economic development. The district will also be home to a next-generation hybrid quantum and classical computing hub as part of the Knoxville Quantum Accelerator, advancing the region's position as a leader in quantum technologies and systems.



The opportunity here is to connect Tennessee's strengths with international networks of expertise, accelerating innovation while training the next generation of scientists in a collaborative environment. Ultimately, this is about people and ideas. We are creating environments where interdisciplinary thinking thrives, where we learn from nature, and where we translate knowledge into solutions that matter for Tennessee and for the world."

Advancing Alzheimer's Research Through Pat Summitt's Enduring Legacy

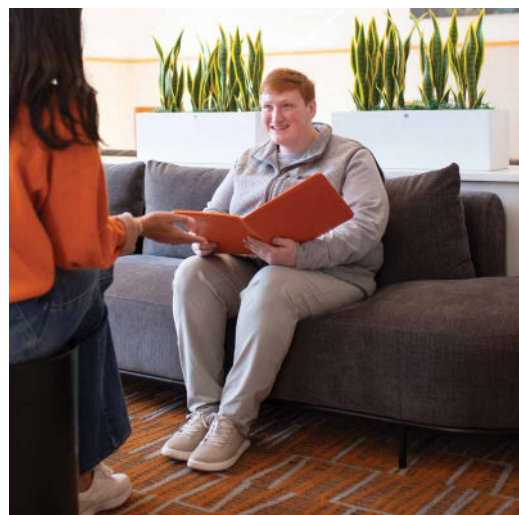
Working in close partnership with the Pat Summitt Clinic—a collaboration between UT Medical Center and the Pat Summitt Foundation—Chunhong Xiao, assistant professor in the College of Nursing, is leading innovative, community-focused dementia research aimed at improving care and outcomes for individuals living with dementia across East Tennessee.

Research Reveals Hidden Biodiversity in Tennessee Rivers

Tennessee researchers made key contributions to genetic research that revealed previously unknown species of freshwater mussels in the Tennessee River Basin. Using genetic analysis, traditional fieldwork, and museum collections, they identified three previously unnoticed species. The revelation has wide implications for conservation protections, research funding, and habitat management decisions.

Thousands of Books from Cormac McCarthy's Library Gifted to UT

UT Libraries received thousands of books from the estate of Pulitzer Prize-winning author and Knoxville native Cormac McCarthy. Numbering between 16,000-18,000 volumes, the titles will be available for checkout by students and scholars, offering valuable insights into the author.
